## Section 1: Research Proposal (20 marks)

Page limit: 4 sides

Please write a research proposal outlining the broad research questions, the research objectives, and a brief methodology for your proposed Phd. Briefly mention the theoretical literature, concepts or literature you propose to engage with. Explain why you think this problem is worth studying.

#### Section 2: Short notes (40 marks)

Page limit: 2 sides

Please write 2 short notes (20 marks each) on contemporary events and their connection to Sociological Theory. Students must choose two from the following 6 questions:

- 1. Explain grounded theory and its methodological significance in directing sociological inquiry?
- 2. Discuss the relationship between gender and 'environmental conservation' in the contemporary era of 'ecological crisis'?
- 3. In light of recent demands for reservation by dominant castes in India (Jats, Patidars, Marathas), explain whether these demands reflect a desire to consolidate their caste power and status, or a reflection of their class position.
- 4. Discuss the methodological significance of participant-observation in sociological/anthropological field research. How does it help in preparing

- designing and doing research? Discuss with reference to any interesting work (or works) that you have read.
- 5. Recent judgments of the Supreme Court appear to stress the need for 'constitutional morality' to filter through society. Using examples of some of these cases critically examine, from a sociological perspective, how successful the judicial path may be in applying fundamental rights to non-state actors.
- 6. We are familiar with the idea that India has a distorted child sex ratio. This has been termed the problem of the 'missing women'. In your answer, you need to clearly delineate, with examples: (a) the various ways through which these women go 'missing' and (b) the micro- and macro-sociological implications that emerge out of this problem.

## Section 3: Theoretical questions (40 marks)

Page limit: 2 sides

Please answer the following questions on Sociological Theory. Students **must choose 2 (20 marks each) from the following 6 questions**:

- 1. Can we use Durkheim's theory and types of suicides to explain farmers' suicides in India? Explain why or why not by briefly elaborating the different types of suicides.
- 2. Briefly outline Max Weber's theory of bureaucracy, and its significance for addressing the problem of social hierarchy.
- 3. Explain Anthony Giddens' structuration approach and outline how it attempts a resolution of the structure-agency problem in sociology.
- 4. MN Srinivas wrote an 'obituary' to caste as a system. Evaluate his position vis-àvis recent scholarship on caste.
- 5. How can we use Marx's theory of primitive accumulation to understand the problems of labour in contemporary India?
- 6. Construct an interview schedule (and a guide to non/participant observation) if this is your research problem: to deploy Bourdieu's concept of 'capitals' to understand the Dalit middle class in Mumbai.
